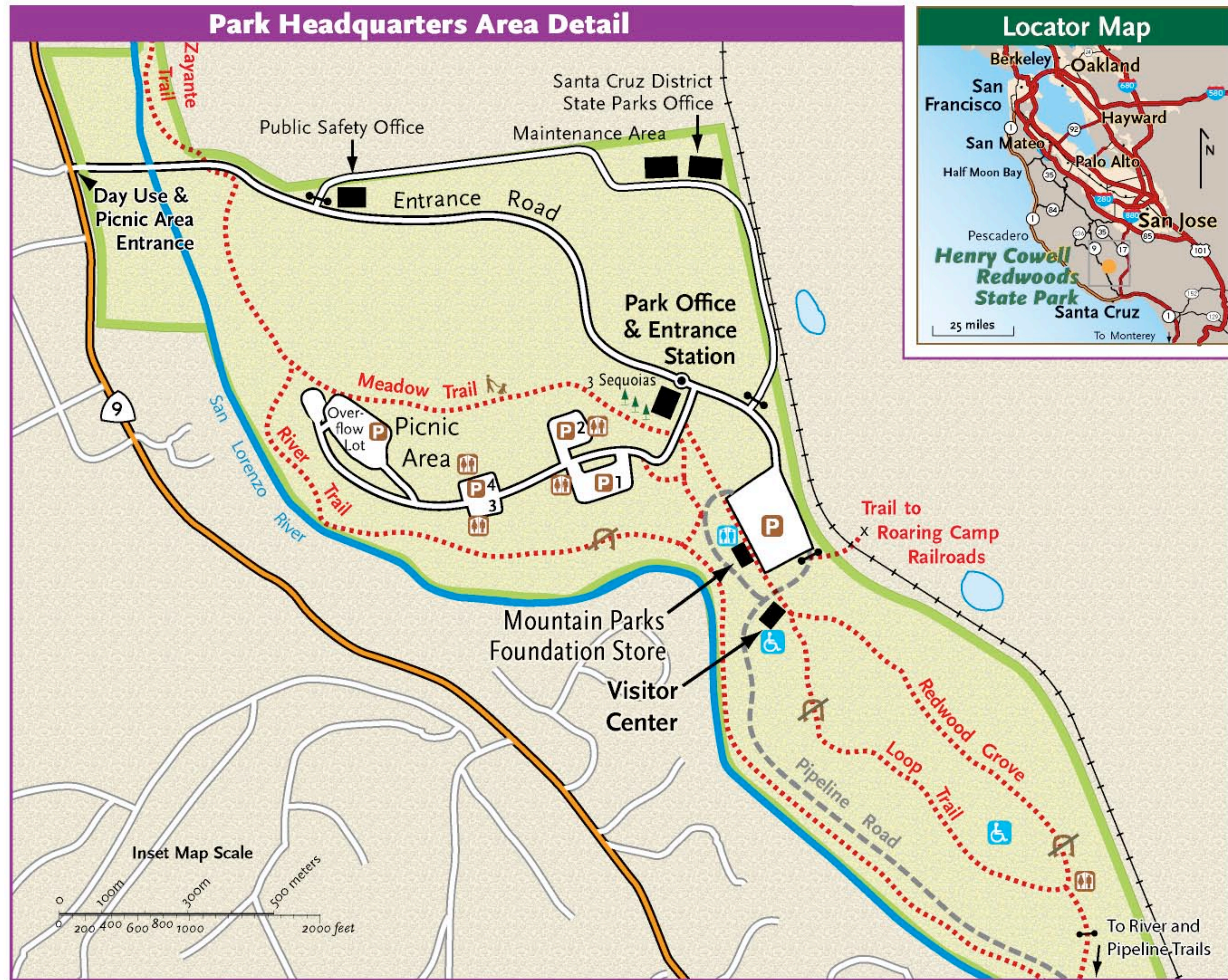


HENRY COWELL REDWOODS STATE PARK

1 : 24 000 trail map with contours, trails, campgrounds, & points of interest

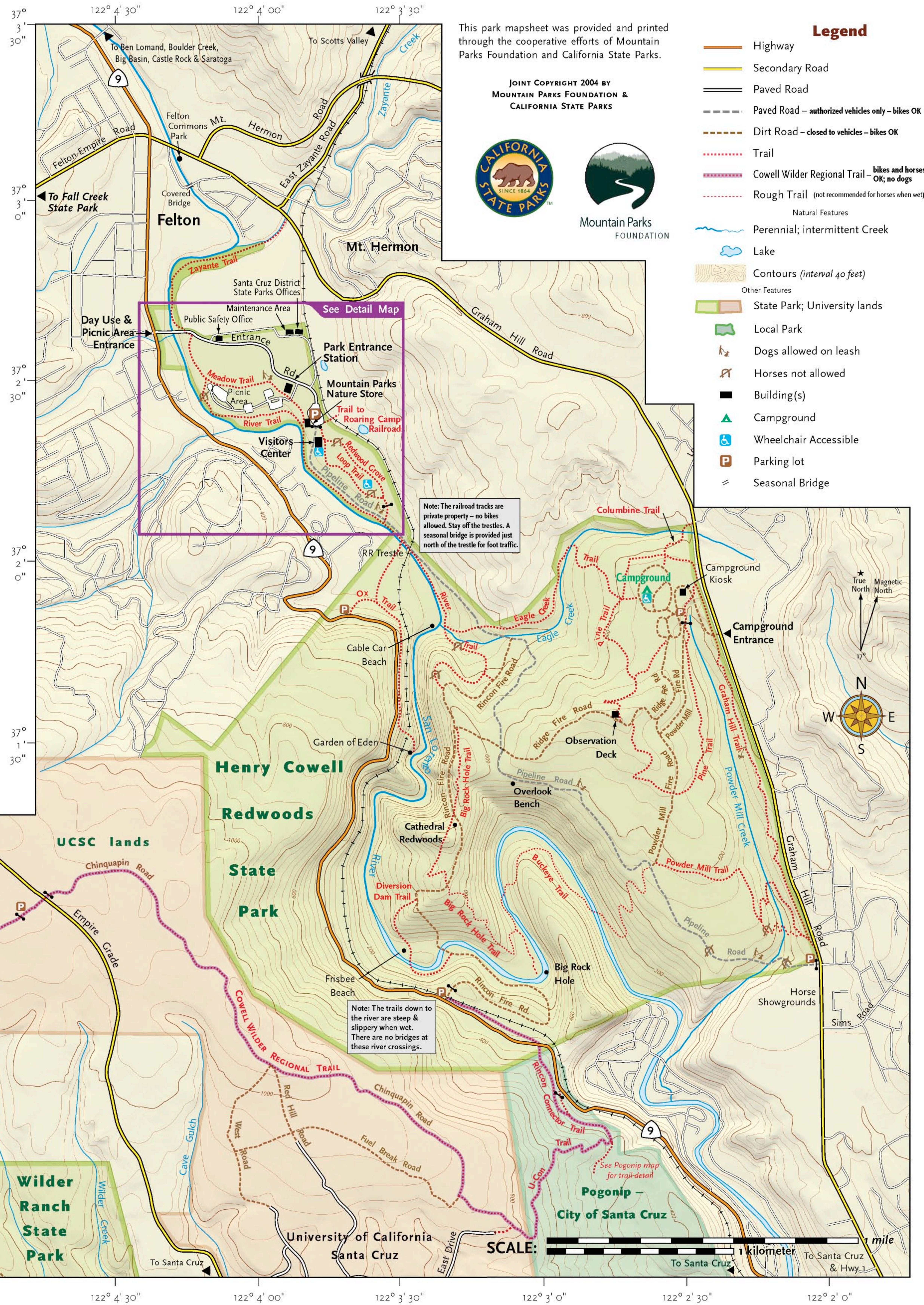

About the Park

Henry Cowell Redwoods State Park has approximately 20 miles of trails. The type of terrain and trail lengths vary. Remember, trails down to the river are steep and there is only one seasonal bridge that crosses the river just to the north of the railroad trestle.

POINTS OF INTEREST

- Redwood Grove Trail** An easy 0.8 mile, flat, wheelchair accessible loop around the giant redwoods. Self-guided brochures are available from the Visitors Center and Nature store.
- The Observation Deck** The highest point in the park offers a view of Santa Cruz and the Monterey Bay and is most quickly reached from the campground by way of the Pine Trail between campsites 47 and 49 (0.4 mile). From Park Headquarters take Pipeline Road to Ridge Fire Road.

Where can I...

- Walk my dog?** On the Meadow Trail at Highway 9 and on the Graham Hill Trail from the campground. Both of these trails lead to Pipeline Road, a 3.3 mile paved road closed to public vehicles where you may also walk your dog. Here you will see magnificent views and beautiful old growth redwoods. Dogs are allowed in the picnic area and in the campground. **Remember dogs must be leashed at all times and can never be left unattended.** Dogs are not allowed in the river or streams.
- Ride my bike?** You may ride on all of the paved roads and fire roads in the park. These are shown as follows on the map: . Bikes are not allowed on trails. Bicyclists under 18 years old must wear a helmet.
- Ride my horse?** You may ride on most trails and fire roads. On the map there are slashed horseshoes indicating areas where horses are not allowed. Many trails are steep and slippery in the winter months. The Buckeye Trail and Columbine Trail routinely close during the rainy season. **Horses are not allowed in the redwood grove or in the campground.**

Please Remember:

- The park is open for use during daylight hours only.
- Camping and overnight use is permitted only in the campground.
- Fires are permitted only in the stoves and fire rings provided. Ground fires are not allowed.
- All vegetation, wildlife, and geological features are fully protected. Do not pick wildflowers or remove any park feature. Stay on designated trails.
- For public health and safety reasons do not feed or leave food out for wildlife.
- Bikes are allowed on park roads; they may not be ridden on any trails. Bicyclists under 18 must wear a helmet.
- Please use garbage cans or pack your trash.
- Dogs must always be on leash, and are allowed on the Meadow Trail, Graham Hill Trail, and Pipeline Road.
